

Structure and mode of operation – Phase VIII – selected items

- 9 Network and 20 WGs
- Executive Committee as of 2010 → See report of GK
- EURISCO Advisory Body (Doc&Info NCG) as of 2008 → clarification sought from Bioversity about EURISCO development
- AEGIS Advisory Committee as of 2007 → ToRs and composition proposed to be revised with evolving AEGIS
- Country quota → good use of assigned quota and Chair's quota: (298+20)/386 - status of use available online



1. Task sharing and capacity building

- Genetic stocks: Inventory of existing genetic stocks for cereals and their conservation status (preliminary step to improve task sharing and capacity building)
- Safety-duplication: Bilateral arrangement Bulgaria-Netherlands (1064 cucurbit accessions). Plans for Solanaceae
- Collecting and monitoring of threatened populations: Wild Avena in Cyprus, Italy and Spain. Plans to collect wild Beta nana in Greece
- Successful EU projects:
 - AGRI Gen Res: AVEQ; EURALLIVEG; LEAFY VEG;
 GrapeGen; AEGRO
 - o FP7: PGR Secure



2. Characterization and evaluation

- Pre-breeding: Workshop on cereals resulting in concept note;
 NordGen Private-Public partnership project on perennial ryegrass pre-breeding.
- Characterization and evaluation:
 - Allium to define core collection and identify duplicates
 - Avena for quality for human consumption and cold tolerance
 - Beta populations to establish baseline of genetic diversity
 - Brassica for morphological, biochemical and molecular description
 - Daucus wild relatives taxonomy characterization and evaluation for disease resistance
 - Harmonized fingerprinting protocols for Malus, Prunus and Pyrus
 - Origanum to monitor genetic diversity and essential oil content
 - Vitis for agronomic and technological traits



3. *In situ* and on-farm conservation and management

- AEGRO and PGR Secure projects
 - Methodologies for CWR and LR in situ management
 - CWR In situ Strategy helpdesk to assist countries
 - Crop Wild Relatives Information system Population level
 Information System allows the search for in situ occurrences
 - Europe-wide national CWR and LR checklists and inventories under development
 - Status of progress of European CWR and LR conservation reviewed
 - Priorities for the future identified (Horizon scanning exercise)
- Crop Network activities:
 - Barley, Forages, Umbellifers, Beta (Beta patula first EU genetic reserve in Madeira)



4. Documentation and Information

- Updates, new C&E data included, improvements and new functions of several ECPGR Central Crop Databases. Some highlights:
 - Links to in situ systems (Avena and Beta)
 - Duplicate search function (Brassica, Tomato)
 - Merging (Forages)
 - Name checking tool to find synonyms and validate names (Malus and Pyrus)
 - Online tools for direct data input from curators (Potato, *Prunus* and *Vitis*)
 - Pictures of accessions: Eggplant, Prunus, Vitis
 - Molecular markers data: Vitis
- PGR DuplicateFinder (CGN) to assist in the identification of putative duplicates



EURISCO – Coordination

- Data from 43 National Inventories and 332 collection holdings.
- The total number of accessions is 1 113 348 (November 2012).
- Accessions flagged as part of MLS: 251 173 from 18 countries
- Help desk function
- 4 country seminars trained 113 people.
- 1 regional workshop trained 30 National Focal Points
- > 900 taxonomy and geo-reference reports sent back to countries to highlight errors and inconsistencies
- A new EURISCO Data Sharing Agreement (DSA) after the end of 2009 and was signed by 20 countries (19 outstanding)
- E-bulletins, factsheets, presentations



EURISCO – Development

- New descriptors (AEGIS)
- Upgraded Web site search and downloading functions
- Taxonomy searches include synonyms
- Taxonomy and geo-reference reports available in real time on countries upload pages
- Road map for the inclusion of C&E data
- Database backbone system under re-development to allow upload of C&E data
- Ongoing data comparative analysis of EURISCO vs.
 WIEWS vs. CCDBs to identify gaps in EURISCO



EURISCO and ECPGR Central Crop Databases – 1

- Vision for a European PGR information landscape (September 2008): need for a changing role of CCDBs
- 12th SC meeting (2010): role and use of CCDBs should be elucidated

The dilemma

- WGs find it increasingly difficult to sustain development of CCDBs
- Frustration that EURISCO does not contain enough passport and crop-specific data to select AEGIS accessions
- At the same time, EURISCO is the official repository of potential AEGIS accessions



EURISCO and ECPGR Central Crop Databases – 2

- Recommendations from the WGs (seemingly contrasting):
 - Invest more on EURISCO and make sure that all relevant data for the selection of AEGIS accessions are available there
 - 2. Rely on CCDBs that are more flexible and suitable for crop-specific needs and can accommodate functions that EURISCO will never have (Synonyms, duplicates, photos, GIS, taxonomy standards, molecular, pedigree, *in situ* data, etc.).
- An increasing role of EURISCO is necessary and can serve both groups, including those who will work with evolving CCDBs as they also need official data.
- WGs requested possibility to discuss relationship between EURISCO and CCDBs in a meeting with NI Focal Points and database managers to agree on common intent for the future – For consideration by SC


